Last June the Committee of 100 and Chamber of Commerce invited several communities in lower Wyoming Valley to meet for the purpose of discussing problems involved in compliance with the State's Clean Streams Program.

NO ACTION TAKEN BY COUNCIL ON SEWAGE DISPOSAL

The question of Pittston City establishing its own sewage disposal plans of system came up for consideration at made available. last night's regular meeting of City Council at City Hall, which was pre-sided over by Mayor John J. Allar-dyce and was attended by all four

Fifteen municipalities of the area bordering on the Susquenanna River in Luzerne County have become affiliated in the Public Services Committee of Wyoming Valley and nine of these have already filed plans for sewage treatment and have plans for sewage treatment and have had the same approved. Pittston City, Exeter and Wyoming have not filed plans for the treatment of sewage, although Pittston City had its engineer, John J. Reilly, prepare these plans some time ago, but has made no move to pay Mr. Reilly, in part or in its entirety, although upwards of \$20,000 has been set aside for such purpose, contingent on receipt of an authoritative opinion that he is entitled to such payment. Mr. he is entitled to such payment. Mr. Reilly is withholding the plans until he is paid, it is understood.

On October 16th, C. A. Von Stein, chairman of the Public Services Committee, with which the 15 municipalities referred to above have become affiliated, submitted the following the committee of lowing communication to Solicitor
J. Earl Langan:
"The Public Services Committee

wishes to express its appreciation of the action of the Pittston City Council in agreeing to participate in the Wyoming Valley area-wide study of Sewage Disposal needs.

"You will remember that the Albright-Friel proposal to undertake this study specifically stipulates that

this study specifically stipulates that the plans of each community or group of communities involved must be made available to his firm. When this contract is finally executed, we will undoubtedly have to meet this to have the plans made available requirement.

SEWAGE DISPOSAL **PROJECT PROVOKES** HEATED ARGUMENT

The controversial question whe ther Pittston City should proceed immediately to set up its own sewage disposal system was again brought up at the regular meeting of City Council last night and provoked a lively discussion. This time City Engineer John J. Reilly, former City Engineer John J. Reilly, former Mayor of Pittston, joined in the repartee and helped to enliven an exchange of opinions between Mayor John J. Allardyce and Councilman Joseph A. Walsh. It was clearly evident that the sewage disposal project has poised a problem which is certain to expand the ever-widening differences among certain members of Council.

Gene Rinaldi and his militant Pro-

Gene Rinaldi and his militant Property Owners Association were represented at the session and their spokesman let it be known that the association is opposed to having Pittston build its own sewage system at this time.

Councilman his stand that he is opposed to ex-penditure of money for additional plans while the city is in possession

plans while the city is in possession of one set of plans. Engineer Reilly interrupted Councilman Walsh to make known that he is owed \$22,600 for the plans now in possession of the city and the argument became so heated that Mr. Reilly told Mr. Walsh "you're acting like a baby". "I can take care of myself; I can stand on my own two feet," Mr. Walsh countered.

Councilman Walsh again proceeded to explain his stand and was interrupted several times by the City Engineer until Mayor John J. Allardyce finally warned Engineer Reilly that he would be forced to ask him to leave the meeting room if he persisted with his interruptions.

Mayor Allardyce suggested at this point that all members of Council and Mr. Rinaldi go to Harrisburg with the plans now in the possession of the city to get a final opinion from officials of the State Sanitary Water Board. This suggestion was finally framed in a motion which passed unanimously.

Before passage of the motion, Engineer Reilly arose to state that he questioned the right of Council to use plans for their Harrisburg trip which had not been paid for. Mayor Allardycie immediately ask-ed Solicitor J. Earl Langan for a ruling. Before giving an opinion, Solicitor Langan suggested that a conference be arranged with State Engineer Bernard Bush and that city officials be guided by the outcome of the conference as to the advisability of the Harrisburg trip since, he pointed out, a "spot ans-wer" will not be given by officials of the Sanitary Water Board. Mayor Allardyce reminded that it may be necessary to call a special meeting of council to act on the Sewage Disposal problem since the budget discussions must be underway next month.

Engineer Reilly is demanding pay-ment, it is the contention of Council-man Walsh that these plans were man waish that these plans were approved by the Federal Government before a federal grant of \$22,000 was made to the city and, therefore, must be acceptable. A decision of much importance to Pittston City and its municipal employes was handed down late yesterday by the Superior Court of the State of Pennsylvania

Luzerne County court en bane has been upheld in its order approving issuance of bonds of \$41,292.63 by Pittston City to meet debts con-tracted for 1951 operating expenses.

The appeal was taken by Attorneys Max Rosenn and Paul R. Orrson, of Wilkes-Barre, on grounds that the city's application to float the issue was "insufficient, invalid and defective."

city Solicitor J. Earl Langan represented the city. The appellants were represented by Attorney Meyer Greenwald of Wilkes-Barre. Costs were placed on the appellants, Rosenn and Orrson.

The city had asked authority to float bonds in the amount of \$91, 292.63 but the court in banc in an order signed by President Judge W. A. Valentine slashed the amount to \$41,292.63, the amount of indebtedness set forth in the city's petition, less a \$50,000 note held by Miners Savings Bank of Pittston.

The decision had been eagerly

The decision had been eagerly awaited here as the extra money is sorely needed to replenish the city treasury which has been running at low ebb in recent weeks. ning at low ebb in recent weeks. There were several payless paydays in prospect for Pittston City employes between now and the first of the New Year if the appellants had succeeded in having the Superior Court deny the loan.

City Solicitor Langan informed the Gazette today that he has not yet received the full text of the Superior Court's decision.

"The tax levy is one mill less than it was when I took office as a city official," Mayor Allardyce said. "In the meantime five raises in wages have been granted to city employes despite the fact that the municipality has lost a number of substantial tax-paying properties, includtial tax-paying properties, including Glennon's Brewery, Howell & King Brewery; the Y. M. I. building; the Perrone building in South Pittston and adjacent buildings, and large portion of Pittston Stove

Pittston and adjacent buildings, and a large portion of Pittston Stove Foundry."

Mr. Rinaldi then queried, "What is this sewage disposal question all about and how much is it going to cost?" Solicitor Langan then outlined the plan for clean streams throughout the nation and informed Mr. Rinalda that most states have complied, tnd the plan is in operation in many sections of Pennsylvania. One of the purposes of the plan, Solicitor Langan pointed out, is to insure a water supply, through use of the waterways of the nation in case of necessity and he called attention to droughts in the west in recent years and the threatened lack of water supply in New York City within recent years.

Francis J. Lenahan, 112 Market street, a member of the taxpayers group present, called attention of Council to a water condition existing on the street where his property is located. He said that water lodges there for long periods. He asked if the proposed sewage disposal system would benefit him and other property owners in that section and was informed that the condition resulted from a faulty sewer system in that locality.

It is very important during the operation of snow plows over grade crossings, that the rail flanges be cleared after the passing of drags, blade machines, scrapers and other equipment to prevent personal injury and property damage.

Will you please issue instructions to your employees and contractors who are engaged for this work to clean the flanges after the passing of any piece of equipment which might deposit material, snow or ice in the flange area?

- I. In view of the survey presently being made by various municipalities in Wyoming Valley, which has as its purpose the saving of a substantial sum of money for Wyoming Valley, a sum which may run into millions of dollars, we are at a loss to understand this head-long rush on the part of the City of Pittston at this time to enter into a contract which would obligate them to spend a substantial sum of money for plans and specifications for a sewage treatment plant. There is, as you know, no necessity for such haste now inasmuch as the Pennsylvania Sanitary Water Board has indicated that it will not penalize any municipality which participates in the survey now being made by the Public Service Committee of the Wyoming Valley Chamber of Commerce. It may very well be that as a result of this survey, the plans and specifications which you are about to prepare may be entirely useless.

We believe the proposed action is not only useless at this time, but may call upon the city to spend a substantial sum of money without securing anything of ultimate value in return. We urge upon you to reconsider your action and ask that you participate with other communities in the survey presently being made by Allbright and Freil, Engineers for the Public Service Committee, and withhold any action for plans and specifications with Mr. Ferris at this time.

We trust you will give this matter your serious consideration.

This presently defunct Association has made commendable progress toward that end, but tragically, just when it has arrived at the most crucial stage in essential negotiations; it has, through lack of necessary support, been stymied and in consequence is in a state of collapse.

For various valid reasons, including the Association's delinquency in salary obligations, its two chief officers have resigned, also several of the Board Members and another officer have ceased to function.

Without question the Association MUST BE REVIVED, reorganized and enlarged; therefore it becomes my responsibility, as the Association's Honorary President, to call an emergency meeting of all respensible, representative and vitally interested parties of the West Branch, North Branch, Juniata Branch, and Main Stem of the Susquehanna River and its tributaries in Pennsylvania, for the purpose of reorganizing and revitalizing this most necessary flood control endeavor.

You are therefore very cordially and urgently invited to attend this reorganization meeting in Williamsport, Pennsylvania, in the Lycoming County Court House, at 3 P. M., E.S.T., Wednesday, December 17, 1952.

At this meeting, in addition to the election of new officers, there will be presented certain specific propositions for the Assembly's consideration, which, it is believed, will assure the Association's life and necessary vigor until its very worthy objective shall have been fully assured.

Dear Sir:

In response to your inquiry relative to the application of the City of Pittston for approval of Federal aid for the purchase of fire equipment to be available for Civil Defense services, in the event of need for the same, I wish to advise you that the records of this office indicate the following:

Your application which is identified by FCDA #02596, was submitted in April 1952, approved by the State Council of Civil Defense under date of April 30, 1952, and subsequently by the Federal authorities.

This application requested approval of the procurement of one 750 Gal. Pumper, 1000 feet of $2\frac{1}{2}$ inch hose, and 1000 feet of $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch hose. It was indicated that the City of Pittston desired approval to acquire the pumper by procurement by the Federal Civil Defense Administration and delivery of the same by that agency to your municipality. The items of hose were to be procured by purchase by your municipality.

The regulations applicable to the procurement plan permitted a municipality to choose between Federal procurement and local procurement. Your application indicates that your choice was for Federal procurement of the pumper and local procurement of the hose, as is stated above.

When you have submitted forms authorizing the shipment of the pumper, and when the same is delivered to you and accepted by you, you will be billed by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, State Council of Civil Defense, for one half of the cost of the same. In your specific case the amount approved for the procurement of the pumper and the delivery to you was \$13,410.00. The amount for which you can be billed is \$6755.00 this being one half of the amount approved. Your check for this amount would be forwarded to Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, State Council of Civil Defense.

The procedure with respect to the procurement of the fire hose is substantially the reverse of the procedure involved in the procurement of the pumper. When you have purchased the hose you should submit to the State Council of Civil Defense a request for reimbursement. Accompanying this request you will submit four copies of the purchase order, two copies of the invoice, and two copies of your payment voucher. The amount approved for these two hose items is \$1660.00. Your request should accordingly be for \$830.00. The figure \$1660.00 represents the amount which would have been involved had the procurement been made by the Federal government. It has generally been true that this represents a cost below that which municipalities have been called upon to pay, however, many municipalities have preferred to make their procurement on a local basis even though the cost involved was greater than the amount which the Federal government was able to offer. Regulations do not permit reimbursement for such purchase in excess of one half of the cost figure which the Federal government has established. This plan of operation would have been likewise applicable had your application indicated that it was your desire to procure the pumper by local purchase, in other words, the maximum amount any municipality can receive as a credit toward the purchase of any

pumper is that to which you are entitled - \$ 6755.00 - regardless of the actual cost involved through a local purchase plan.

The reason for the options of manner of procurement, by the Federal government or by local purchase, was designed to give both the Federal agency and the municipality the benefit of such lower cost as might result from the purchase of equipment in quantity. While some communities choose to make their own procurement of all items in which they were interested many others chose, as you did, to have the Federal government make certain purchases. So far as I know, a saving did result to those communities which chose to have the Federal government make the purchase and the delivery.



CITY BUDGET FOR \$408,183 WAS PASSED ON FINAL READING

Pittston City Council unanimously adopted its 1953 budget totaling \$403,183.01 and the tax ordinance levying 19 mills on real property, together with a poll tax of \$1 on all male inhabitants of the city over 21 years of age on final reading last night.

The tax millage is the same as last year, 15 mills being levied for general purposes and 4 mills for sinking fund purposes

The new budget is \$35,627.11 less than the 1952 budget of \$443,810.12, the reduction resulting mainly from a decrease in the loan in indebtedness of the city of \$20,000 from \$50,-000 to \$30,000 and a reduction in bills payable of \$10,967.70 from \$41,-770.63 to \$30,802.93.

The budget adopted on final read-ing is identical with the budget passed tentatively on first reading several weeks ago, no changes having been made in appropriations to various departments and published at that time. All other aspects of the budget are the same as contained in the original budget.

There is no provision in the new budget for salary increases.

One of the features of the budget however, is the extension of Social Security coverage for all employes and officers of the city. City Clerk John D. McNulty was directed to draw up a plan for salary deductions from employes and for the city's contribution to the cost to be submitted to the State Agency, un-der the provisions of the Enabling Act 491. An allocation of \$2,000 has been made in the budget to cover the city's contribution to the Social

Security cost.

Mayor John J. Allardyce presided at the session at which all members were present.

A lengthly discussion on the sewsystem followed reading of a communication from State Engineer Bernard Bush acknowledging receipt of copies of the contract entered into between Engineer Frederick Ferris and the City of Pittston for plans for the sewage disposal system.

The letter informed council that the material submitted is "accepted and endorsed", being preliminary nature pending submission of

The letter also advised council to proceed immediately to formulate a program for construction and financing the sewage disposal system and setting up of an Authority for the sewage disposal program.

Immediately following the reading of the letter a resolution was adopted authorizing the payment of \$17,000 on account to Engineer Frederick Ferris for the plans submitted

to the State Water Board.

Councilman Joseph Walsh and Thomas Kehoe cast dissenting votes the resolution and on receiving a filing of the Bush letter. Mayor Allardyce and Councilman Patrick Collins and Charles Infantino voted affirmatively in both instances. In the discussion which followed, discussion which followed, Councilman Kehoe explained that the only reason for his opposition to the approval of the contract with Mr. Ferris and subsequent measures pertaining to the plans was that he held that in all fairness and from a practical standpoint other engineers should have been invited to submit plans so that a variety of ideas could be obtained. The \$17,000 to be paid Mr. Ferris will be disbursed from the \$22,000 loan grant from the Federal Works Agency for the preparation of plans which has been held in escrow for this purpose for some time by the city.

Eugene Rinaldi, South Main street merchant and president of Pittston City Property Owners' Association, led the discussion on the sewage disposal problem, during which former objections were repeated and reaffirmed and the council's position outlined by Solicitor J. Earl Langan who reminded that Pittston City officials were cited by the State De-partment of Justice for the delinquency in complying with the State mandate to proceed with plans for the sewage disposal system and the case referred to the State Attorney General to proceed against city officials under the provisions and pen-alties of the Clean Streams Act.

Mr. Rinaldi argued that the city is not in financial position to meet the cost of the sewage disposal system and the taxpayers will be unable to shoulder the burden of such a costly undertaking.

Daniel Cardascia was among the representatives of the Taxpayers' Association present who participated briefly in the discussion.

At one point in the discussion So

licitor Langan pointed out that, in his opinion, Pittston City has obtained the most advantageous contract for plans of any contracts he has inspected.

A resolution was adopted authorizing Solicitor Langan to engage real estate experts and consulting counsel in preparation for the pend-

Relative to your request for preliminary approval of the material which has already been submitted in connection with this application, please be advised that such formal approval is not given. However, as soon as possible we will write you concerning the status of the application, plans, reports, etc., relative to acceptance thereof as preliminary material.

I wish to take this opportunity to remind the City of Pittston of the fact that because of its delinquency with respect to failure to submit satisfactory construction plans and failure to start construction of sewage treatment works in accordance with Sanitary Water Board directives, the city was referred to the Department of Justice for appropriate action. As was explained in meetings with Council, the matter of completing plans is imperitive but does not deter the city from following our urgent suggestions that council give serious consideration to setting up a financial program and if necessary, creation of an authority in order to fulfill the city's obligations.

On January 13, 1953, your Solicitor Mr. J. Earl Langan wrote us a letter transmitting five copies of a contract between the City and Frederick Ferris, Consulting Engineer, which constitutes fulfillment of a requirement in making application for grantin-aid from the Commonwealth for preparation of plans, which material was to be incorporated with the above application received in this office May 19, 1949. We also understand that consummation of the contract is, at least in part, in accordance with requirements of the Department of Justice.

In his letter Mr. Langan requested that the city be furnished with a certificate of preliminary approval of plans, etc., which have been submitted. Formal preliminary certification is not given as such. However, we are herein setting forth facts and information which will indicate that the material was accepted and endorsed being preliminary in nature pending submission of final detail plans, etc., upon which we could recommend final approval to the Sanitary Water Board.

Under date of May 31, 1949, in accordance with a request from the Federal Works Agency, Division Engineer C. H. Young wrote Mr. W. J. Finley, District Engineer, in connection with the Federal loan in which Pittston was involved. The second paragraph of his letter is as follows:

"In accordance with your request to be advised as to the status of sewerage plans and specifications involving the release of the final payment of Federal Works Agency funds, this is to inform you that the aforesaid plans and accompanying data have been examined by the Bureau of Sanitary Engineering, which finds that these plans provide for the conveyance of the sewage of the City to a suitable site for treatment and are satisfactory to the Bureau. The degree of sewage treatment proposed is in excess of that required, although the plans have been prepared so that either the primary treatment units or the complete plant can be constructed, and the general bases of design, the capacities of the plant units, and their arrangement are satisfactory to the Bureau".

. Mr. Young's letter resulted from recommendations of this office following our review of the preliminary report, plans, etc. Subsequently upon further study and review this office wrote letters to the consulting engineer under dates of March 6, 1949 and April 17, 1951 advising that upon preliminary study, it had been found that before final review and study could be made, additional information,

revisions and corrections would be necessary. Up to this time such information has not been forthcoming. However, we understand that with consummation of the above referred to contract, Pittston City plans to complete all requirements in order that favorable action may be taken upon the request contained in the application and issue a permit therefor.

As in past correspondence and personal conferences with Council, we again urge the expeditious submission of the final detail plans, specifications, etc., and that Pittston City take immediate steps to formulate a construction program.

I thought you would like to have the following information: where application is made for Civilian Defense authorities to furnish the apparatus, it is necessary for the city to make application to that authority, and they will supply the city with any particular make of apparatus which the authority is buying in quantity lots.

These units are usually assembled jobs. That is, the motor and pump are made by different manufacturers, and they are usually very plain with little or no chrome plating. On the other hand, a city can purchase the equipment themselves, purchasing the make they want, and can still get in the neighborhood of \$7,000.00 refund from Civilian Defense if the apparatus complies with the minimum requirements set up by Civilian Defense.

We have sold a great many units on the latter basis, and we feel that you will probably want to do the same thing rather than accept a unit as furnished by Civilian Defense.

I will be in Pittston on Tuesday, February 10, and hope to have a chance to talk to you at that time.

City Council went formally on record last night at a regular meet-ing in City Hall as being unalterably opposed to the proposed increase in rates suggested by the Scranton-Spring Brook Water Com-

pany.

The City Clerk read the contents of a postal card with the name Ruli-son Evans, chairman of the Board and President of the water company attached, which provided notice that a boost in the rates is contemplated and that application has been made to the Public Utility Commission for permission to make these rates effective. It was stated on the card that "the average increase to residential consumers will be about one-tenth cents per day. Commercial and industrial consumers' rates will be increased proportionately."

The vote authorizing the protest was unanimous. Councilman Thomas

COUNCIL CONTROL ACQUIRED BY TRIO OPPOSED TO MAYOR

Control of the destinies of Pittston City Council passed definitely from the hands of Mayor John J. Allardyce last night at a special meeting called for general purposes. Councilman Charles Infantino, herefofore a staunch adherent of the Mayor, voted along with his colleagues, Thomas J. Kehoe and Joseph A. Walsh, to dictate the policies of the governing body. Councilman Patrick J. Collins continues his allegance to the

The break, which had been predicted in recent days, establishes John C. Kehoe, of Harding, in the "driver's seat" of City Council once more and adds spice to the pre-Printery election campaign in which Mr. Kehoe, a brother to Councilman Kehoe, is fighting with characteristic fiervor the re-nomination of Mayor Allardyce, and he has the influential group of Republican County officeholders within Pittston City allied with him.

In a prepared statement, Councilman Walsh informed his colleagues and a crowded Council Chamber that it is felt there is extravagance in conduct of the Street Department and he intimated that the department rolls are being stacked with unnecessary employes as a political move. As Director of Accounts and Finance he noted, he said, that whereas \$13,697.47 has been budgeted in this city for all Street Department purposes this year, \$6,119.64 of that amount has already been spent before the third month of the current year is at an end. This despite the fact that we have had a comparatively "open winter."

Mr. Walsh also stated that \$5,729.82 of the \$14,088.66 budgeted for collection of ashes this year has already been spent. He remarked that the Street Department is overloaded by about 20 men. He submitted a list of names of the last livefity men hirod by the Street Department and he offered a motion that they be relieved of their jobs. Those deprived of their assignments, as read out by the secretary, are: Edward Enjoe Sam G.ambra, Ray Allford Robert Morgan, Michael Freas, John Cawley, Philomeno Forlenza Charles Randis, Anthony Lanzone, Joseph McGuiness, Joseph Miller, Angelu Capitano, Gerald Hobbs, William Norbut, Michael Biscotta, John Shoback, Peter Ciali, Liborio Monteforte, Frank Licata, James Loftus.

The importance of the new alignment on Council cannot be overemphasized, especially in veiw of the fact that the three present members of City Council whose terms expire next January — Mayor Allardyce and Messrs Kehoe and Infantino—have upwards of nine months to serve, regardless of how they fare in the May 19th primary, and Mr. Infantino is not a candidate to succeed himself. The transition was achieved quietly and any animosity harbored by the lawmakers was not evident on the surface.

"Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Pittston, and it is hereby ordained by authority of

"Section 1—That the Superintendent of Streets be and he is hereby authorized and empowered and directed to hire and discharge any or all per diem employes and laborers of the City over whom he has of the City over whom he has supervision subject however, to the approval and statutory power of the City Council of the City of Pitts-

ton.
"Section 2—This ordinance shall take effect ten days after its pass-

"Section 3—All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent

herewith are hereby repealed.



Mrs. Simmons is the former Frances Krososky, very efficient and competent employe. After her resignation was accepted Council voted to place Edwin A. MAYOR PROPOSES **FOUR FOR VACANCY** ON FORCE; REJECTED

The names of four Pittston young men who are applicants for positions on the city police force, and have been certified by the Civil Service Board as having qualified at a recent examination, were submitted seriatim by Mayor John J. Allardyce at a meeting of City Council last night. Each name was rejected in turn by a majority vote of Council. Councilmen Joseph A. Walsh, Thomas Kehoe and Charles Intantino voted "no" on each of the Mayor's recommendations. Councilman Patrick Collins' affirmative vote, with that of the Mayor, was insufficient and ineffective.

The names were given by Frank A. Earley, secretary of the Civil Service Commission, in order of their rating—Joseph Delaney, Sandy Lafocas Joseph Devilaitis, Frank W. Falzone and Joseph Dougher. However, their pat the order in which ever, this is not the order in which the Mayor, as head of the Depart-ment of Public Affairs, submitted them to his colleagues. At the out-set, City Solicitor J. Earl Langan advised that the list should contain only four names. The Mayor only four names. The Mayor explained that Lafoca and Devilaitis had tied with 90 average each and he had been advised by Mr. Earley that, in this case, the five names should be included. On the advice of the solicitor, however, Dougher's name was dropped.

Falcone's name was submitted first and Mr. Kehoe inquired if he were highest on the list. The Mayor answered negatively and the adverse vote followed. (It was stated specifically that the appointment was to fill a vacancy created by the death of Patrolman Anthony Levenoskie).

Delaney's name was next presented and Mr. Infantino inquired if he were older than the prescribed age. The Mayor countered. "He's a veteran". Mr. Infantino stated: "I

thought he was over forty". The Mayor advised: "No. He's not".
At this point Tom Foley, enthroned in his seat of vantage at the rear of the Council Chamber, silently approached the Council en-closure, tapped Mr. Infantino on the shoulder, and imparted the advice in a whisper: "There's no age limit for appointments in Third Class Cities". A call was then asked for a vote on Delaney and he was rejected by the usual three-to-two

Next, in order, came Joseph Devilaitis, of Mill street; Sandy Lafoca, of 54 East Oak street; and they were

rejected by majority vote.

The Mayor then suggested that the Civil Service Commission be asked to submit another group of four names from a list of eligibles. This motion prevailed over the dissenting vote of Mr. Walsh. After Mr. Walsh voted "no", Mr. Kehoe remarked: "I don't know why we shouldn't have a new list, and he voted "yes", with Messrs. Collins, Infantino and the Mayor following



A communication was read from C. A. Von Stein, chairman of the Public Services Committee, Wyoming Valley Chamber of Commerce, apprising Council that all of the fifteen Wyoming Valley Communities have paid their proportionate share in the cost of the proposed survey of the waste disposal problem in this area. Some time ago Pittston City endorsed a move of the fifteen to have a contract prepared for employment of Albright and Friel, Inc. to undertake the survey of the sewage treatment problem in Wyo-ming Valley. - (b) To review the present sewage treatment plans, specifications and reports of MUNICIPALITY as they exist and are on file at

- (c) To study the populations and sewage flows in MUNICIPALITY and the other said municipalities.
- (d) To prepare a general comprehensive master plan showing the affected area along the Susquehanna River, including MUNICIPALITY and the other said municipalities.
 - (e) To make alternate studies and show on a master plan a system for the utilization of a joint sewage treatment plant and interceptors for MUNICIPALITY in conjunction with all of said other municipalities or with one or more other municipalities if it proves to be economically feasible to separate the project into several sewage treatment plants instead of one plant.
 - (f) To make a general investigation in conjunction with said field reconnaissance and a study of the industries involved in the area, including a study of all reports of investigations of particular manufacturing plants and industries furnished to ENGINEER by MUNICIPALITY and the other municipalities, and including the sending of a questionnaire to each industry to determine the wastes which would emanate from each individual industrial plant which might be served by a joint project or projects.
 - (g) To make studies which would embrace the economic feasibility of other alternate projects and to show each alternate project on a separate master plan.
 - (h) To make general over-all construction cost estimates for a single joint project or for several joint projects as contrasted with the over-all construction cost for individual projects for each municipality.

 - (j) To make a study of the methods to be used in financing the cost of construction in the various projects and alternate schemes, whether it he a single joint collection and disposal system or multiple collection and disposal systems or individual collection and disposal systems for the respective municipality involved.

Such materials so made available by MUNICIPALITY to ENGINEER shall include all existing reports of investigations of particular industries and manufacturing plants. In the event that there have been changes in such industries and manufacturing plants, subsequent to the reports so furnished by MUNICIPALITY to ENGINEER, MUNICIPALITY agrees to furnish ENGINEER with information as to such changes. CITIZENS' BOARD RE **PITTSTO**

At last night's regular meeting of City-Council, presided over-by Mayor Joseph F. Saporito and atlended by all four Councilmen, the recently appointed Citizens' Traffic Committee, of which Attorney Patrick J. Flannery is chairman, submitted some suggestions to relieve traffic congestion and provide additional parking facilities. The report in its entirety is published below.

Council voted to accept the report

Edwin A. Sites, of 13 Mill street, was appointed City Clerk pro tem during the illness of John D. Mc-Nulty.

Mayor Joseph F. Saporito pre-sented his report on collections dur-ing August. It included \$831 from parking meters, \$35 in parking violations and \$30 in miscellaneous

fines.
City Treasurer George Turner reported a balance of \$66,064.86 in all funds or \$3,176.74 in the general fund. He also reported collections of \$1,310.39 in delinquent taxes and \$146 in City licenses.
Bills totaling \$7,801.88 were approved for payment when funds are available.

Reports also were made by Mrs. Thomas Newcomb, Health Officer and City Sealer of Weights and Measures.

Following is the complete text of the Citizens' Traffic Committee's report and recommendations:

Pittston, Penna. September 4, 1953

Hon. Joseph F. Saporito, City Hall.

Pittston, Pa Dear Mayor Saporito:

Pursuant to your request we have made a thorough survey of certain streets in the City for the purpose of protecting the public, reducing traffic hazards, relieving traffic congestion, and providing additional parking facilities. One of our primary concern has been the free and uninterprinted movement of fire anuninterrupted movement of fire apparatus at all times.

We are keenly aware that the traffic and parking problem is not applicable to Pittston alone. All traffic and parking problem is not applicable to Pittston alone. All cities are confronted with the same problem. However, the situation in our City is made more acute by its layout which prevents channelization of through traffic.

In this, our preliminary report which we believe is applicable to the more serious problems, we submit the following recommendations

mit the following recommendations

for your consideration:

1. The creation of loading and unloading zones in each block on both sides of Main Street from Oak to Mill Streets. The size and location of these zones we leave to the discretion of the Police Department. We strongly urge that wherever pos-sible, the proprietors of business establishments on Main Street will load and unload in the rear of their business establishments.

2. That streets intersecting Main 2. That streets intersecting Main Street such as Market, Spring, Dock, Charles, Thomas and Butler, Streets, should be marked "Keep Clear" in order that traffic from the opposite lane may enter freely and thereby prevent a traffic blockage on Main Street.

That all streets intersecting Main be kept clear on both sides for a distance of 25 feet from the intersection. This will permit free and easy ingress and egress.

4. No parking on either side of Spring Street in order to prevent any interference with the fire apparatus of the Eagle Hose Company.

5. That between the hours of 3:30

5. That between the hours of 3:30 p. m. and 5:15 p. m. on week days, or for longer or shorter periods in the discretion of the Police Department, no parking be permitted on the easterly side of Main Street between Charles and William Streets. We suggest that the feasibility of this recommendation be determined by

a two weeks trial period.
6. That the parking rates and times be changed in the following)

manner:
(a) Five Cents for the first half hour and an additional Five Cents for every half hour thereafter for a

period of two hours.
7. That Devaney Court be made
a one-way street from Spring to

Charles Streets.

We believe that a trial period of 60 days for the above recommenda-tions will disclose any inadequacy which can be corrected before final adoption, and that notice by means of newspaper announcements, etc., should be extensively given to the public before the trial period is inaugurated.

Dear Mayor Saporito:

Pursuant to your request we have made a thorough survey of certain streets in the City for the purpose of protecting the public, reducing traffic hazards, relieving traffic congestion, and providing additional parking facilities.

One of our primary concerns has been the free and uninterrupted movement of fire apparatus at all times.

We are keenly aware that the traffic and parking problem is not applicable to Pittston alnoe. All cities are confronted with the same problem. However, the situation in our City is made more acute by its layout which prevents channelization of through traffic.

In this, our preliminary report which we believe is applicable to the more serious problems, we submit the following recommendations for your consideration:

- 1. The creation of loading and unloading zones in each block on both sides of Main Street from Oak to Mill Streets. The size and location of these zones we leave to the discretion of the Police Department. We strongly urge that wherever possible, the proprietors of business establishments on Main Street will load and unload in the rear of their business establishments.
- 2. That streets intersecting Main Street such as Market, Spring, Dock, Thomas and Butler Streets, should be marked "Keep Clear" in order that traffic from the opposite lane may enter freely and thereby prevent a traffic blockage on Main Street.
- 3. That all streets intersecting Main be kept clear on both sides for a distance of 25 feet from the intersection. This will permit free and easy ingress and egress.
- 4. No parking on either side of Spring Street in order to prevent any interferance with the fore apparatus of the Eagle Hose Company.
- 5. That between the hours of 3:30 p. m. and 5:15 p. m. on week days, or for longer or shorter periods in the discretion of the Police Department, no parking be permitted on the easterly side of Main Street between Charles and William Streets. We suggest that the feasibility of this recommendation be determined by a two weeks trial period.
- 6. That the parking rates and times be changed in the following manner:
 - (a) Five Cents for the first half hour and an additional Five Cents for every half hour thereafter for a period of two hours.
- 7. That Devaney Court be made a one-way street from Spring to Charles Streets.

We believe that a trial period of 60 days for the above recommendations will disclose any inadequacy which can be corrected before final adoption, and that notice by means of newspaper announcements, etc., should be extensively given to the public before the trial period is inaugurated.

Your letter of September 8, 1953 to Dr. Russell E. Teague,

requesting information on the redent legislation concerning financial aid to municipalities in connection with sewage treatment works, has been referred to me because of Dr. Teague's absence.

Act. No. 339, approved August 20, 1953 by the Governor, "Provides for payments by the Commonwealth to municipalities which have expended money to acquire and construct sewage treatment plants in accordance with the Clean Streams Program and making an appropriation." This bill begins a new program of State subsidies indicating annual payments by the Commonwealth to municipalities and municipal authorities for sewage treatment purposes. An appropriation of \$2 million dollars is made, with payments not to exceed 2% of the costs for the acquisition and construction of such sewage treatment works by municipalities and municipal authorities. Construction is construed to mean construction of new treatment works, main pump station and intercepting sewers which are integral parts of the treatment facilities. Provision is made for payments to be made the first day of July 1954 and annually thereafter, with the payments to be made to those municipalities or municipal authorities after the municipalities or municipal authorities after the secretary of Health, the amounts expended for the acquisition and construction of the sewage treatment works.

We are arranging a conference with the Attorney General's Office to review the provisions of the law and various questions thereto, following which Rules and Regulations will be prepared for distribution. Copies of the Act have not as yet been printed, and as soon as copies are available, these likewise will be distributed. We will place your name on the mailing list to receive early information on this subject. This legislation would appear to provide substantial assistance to municipalities in connection with financing the operation and construction of the treatment works.

SECTION 2. Sections 6 and 10 of the said Ordinance are hereby repealed.

COUNCIL PASSES CITY BUDGET AS FIRST INTENDED

City Council met last night at City Hall with Mayor Joseph F. Saporito presiding and adopted the appropriation ordinance for 1954 by unanimous vote, exactly as the tentative budget was drawn one month ago. All of the Councilmen were present and all voted affirmatively.

present and all voted affirmatively. The millage was set at 20, one mill increase from last year, accounted for by an increased obligation from the Sinking Fund. Fifteen mills have been set aside for general purposes and five for the Sinking Fund. The budget anticipates revenue of \$506,764,33 compared with \$408,183.01 at this time last year.

It is noteworthy that "Wages—Street Cleaning" has been cut from \$14,000 to \$9,000.

Property owners of the Mill Street area, who are deeply distressed on account of the damage caused to their homes within recent weeks by recurring surface subsidences due to mine caves and are gravely concerned for the safety of their children and themselves, attended the meeting in a body. Mr. Anthony Zack was the spokesman for the petitioners and explained in detail how the homes had become twisted by frequent surface settlings. He also called Council's attention to the action taken by the Wilkes-Barre City Council during the recent surface subsidences in that city and asked why our City Officials had not taken a similar action. Mayor Joseph Saporito and Mr. Thomas Hehoe called upon Mr. Nelson Myers, City Engineer to answer Mr. Zack. Mr. Myers gave a complete and comprehensive report on the mining conditions in that area, referring to mining maps etc. He called their attention to a recent conference between the City Officials and officials of the Pittston Gas Company relative to gas leaks and the precautions that were taken. Mr. Myers called attention to the fact that the last mining done in that area was done by the Morgan Coal Company about August 1, 1942. Several property owners asked if the coal company can be compelled to repair the damage to their homes and sidewalks. Solicitor J. Justin Blewitt further enlightened the petitioners by explaining that, if there were any reckless or illegal mining when the coal was being removed, the statute of limitations has now expired since an action in tort must be started within six years of the date that mining expires. Mr. Frank H. Miller, 53 Mill St., spoke at length, he stated that he realized and appreciates the expressions of the members of Council and asked if something can be done in lowering their taxes to relieve the financial burden.

N. Myers that there is a continuing surface movement in the Mill street quarter, and that the situation is continually "under surveillance."

Mr. Zack, who owns a home in the area persisted in his demand that the Mayor appoint a committee to attempt other means of obtaining relief and Council readily agreed and directed the Mayor to name such a committee. (At the close of the meeting Mayor Saporito informed newspapermen present that he had appointed Solicitor
J. Justin Blewitt, Engineer R. N.
Myers and Councilmen Thomas Kehoe and Joseph A. Walsh to this

committee).

An important matter of business was passage of a resolution which authorized the proper officers to petition the Court of Quarter Sessions of Luzerne County for permission to fund the unfunded debt of the City of Pittston in the sum of \$148,412.51, representing present financial obligations. This is a move in the legal process to permit Council to issue bonds in the sum of \$175,000 to pay off funded debt and to allow for other essential outlays. The Mayor and City Clerk were empowered to take the

necessary legal steps.

Michael J. Mack to erect a sidewalk sign at 35 South Main street. Pittston Centennial, Committee, Albert Lipperini, 117 street, secretary: To conduct a carnival at Gilmartin Park in conjunction with the city's centennial observance.

These permits were referred to the heads of the proper departments.
